course design & objectives : This course includes in-depth study of the physical, biological, and human environment. Emphasis is on the multitude of interrelated factors that affect the life forms on our planet and the evolutionary processes that are responsible for their abundance and distribution. Contemporary issues related to changes in our ecosystems are analyzed from a scientific perspective throughout the course. May satisfy the Science in Depth requirement for non-Environmental Science & Policy majors.

prerequisites : It is assumed that all students enrolled in the course possess an open mind, a willingness to learn and to excel, and a demonstrated ability to think critically.

course requirements : All students are responsible for
1) six to eight in-class 'quizzes',
2) a mandatory comprehensive final examination,
3) one (minimum) to three (maximum) written assignments at my discretion,
4) class participation.

The quizzes will consist of a combination of multiple-choice, short-answer and essay questions and will include calculations. Anything covered in class is fair game for the exams. It is open season on knowledge! Quizzes (20 - 25 minutes maximum) will be announced in advance and administered at the beginning of the lecture. When possible, these will be scheduled at the last lecture of the week.

Feel free to bring a calculator but not one built into any device with wireless capability. Be certain that you have the appropriate type of batteries and know, in advance, how to use the calculator.

(cont'd) course requirements : Detailed instructions for preparing the written assignment will be posted online along with a grading rubric. Follow the instructions to maximize your score. Credit will be deducted (10% per day or portion thereof) for late work.

Unless otherwise instructed : 1) do not slide material under my office door, 2) do not send material via campus mail, 3) hand-in all material during class.

grading : The course grade will be determined by : average of eight (8) in-class quizzes {40% - 50%*} + mandatory comprehensive final exam {25%} + written assignment(s) {15% - 25%*} + class participation {10%}.

The grades will not be curved. Your grade will be based on your performance and not on your effort, *per se*. In my experience, course grades reveal little about your worth as a human being. incomplete : A grade of “I” (Incomplete) may be given only in exceptional cases in which extenuating circumstances that occur in the last 10 days of the semester interfere with the completion of final course work.

In addition,

- 1) You must be up-to-date on all other work and exams.
- 2) You must be maintaining at least a C average.
- 3) You must have an acceptable attendance record up to that point.

Note : Students arriving late on exam / quiz dates will be permitted to take the quiz / exam as long as no other student has finished and left the room.

“Students are not required to take three final exams on any one day.
